OSS stakeholders meet to discuss COVID-19 pandemic

The Operation Sukuma Sakhe (OSS) held a stakeholder information session meeting at the Ladysmith Town Hall under Alfred Duma Local Municipality with Dr T Zulu from uThukela District Operation Sukuma, uThukela District Speaker Cllr PG Strydom, Alfred Duma local Municipality Deputy Mayor Cllr T Hadebe, Alfred Duma Municipality Speaker Cllr Ngubane, Al Imdaad Foundation and

Addressing the audience the Speaker Cllr Strydom raised serious concerns about the pandemic and the importance of fighting against it as the District as well as giving the correct information to the community. The Coronavirus (COVID-19) has been declared a global pandemic by the World Health Organization (WHO) and there are also confirmed cases in South Africa that keep on escalating including those cases in the province.

The Provincial Executive Council held on the 11th March 2020 and approved a programme of intense community mobilization that should be followed by all MEC Champions in an effort to educate and share information about the virus and all the preventative measures to minimize the spread of the deadly virus.

First COVID-19 case was confirmed on the 5th of March 2020 in Pietermaritzburg. The patient OSS DTT Chairperson Dr T Zulu addressing was admitted at Greys Hospital and is in a stable condition. The Provincial Tracer teams are on the ground putting all precautionary measures in place to deal with containment of the virus through mapping contact cases and testing.



Precautions to take;

- * Avoid contact with live animals, poultry and birds
- * Avoid consumption of raw and undercooked meat
- * Avoid crowded places and around people who are unwell
- * Observe good personal hygiene at all times
- * Wash hands frequently with soap
- * Cover your mouth with a tissue paper when coughing or sneezing
- * See a doctor if you are unwell

Mayor welcomes the healthcare train in Ladysmith

UThukela District Mayor Cllr AS Mazibuko accompanied by Alfred Duma Deputy Mayor Cllr T Hadebe, Sakhile Xaba from I Care and officials visited the Phelophepha Health Care Train on Tuesday morning, February 18. The purpose was to officially welcome the train which was stationed in Ladysmith for two weeks.

The team was warmly received by Dr Thabiso Manabela who explained that the Phelophepha Train was established in 1994 focusing on the disadvantaged and rural communities rendering primary health care services. The train is operated on a day-to-day basis by a team of professionals, consisting of dedicated and committed staff.

The train treats minor ailments. In cases of major ailments the train do referrals to hospitals for intensive medical attention. Close to 200 people are attended each day. Services offered include; Edu-Clinic, Roche Health Clinic, Eye Clinic, Dental Clinic and Counselling Clinic. It also created a number of temporary job opportunities for the locals.

The Mayor Cllr Mazibuko appreciated the efforts put forward by Transnet in bringing such services to the community of Ladysmith. He also acknowledged job opportunities created by the project in



the process. The team was then taken to the tour visiting various coaches inside the train where a variety of services were offered and the Mayor briefly spoke to the people.

The MEC also mentioned a lot of programmes run by the Department to uplift the people from poverty.

"It is our wish to see our people become economically active by seizing the opportunities presented to them by government. We conduct workshops to educate people about the effects of renting out their businesses to other people," said Dube-Ncube.



MEC Dube-Ncube also briefed the guests about growing cannabis for commercial purposes which will require one to possess a licence. The Cable Car project is still on the cards. It is envisaged to boost tourism industry. She also touched on the challenges faced by the district as a whole with regards to service delivery, crime, domestic violence, health care, etc. She called upon all to fold their sleeves and get down to work. Alfred Duma Deputy Mayor Cllr T Hadebe gave a vote of thanks.

Temporary shelters for the homeless

omeless people have been encouraged to move to temporary shelters during the COVID-19 lockdown announced by President Cyril Ramaphosa. He briefly mentioned this in his address that temporary shelters must be identified to accommodate homeless people for at least 21 days.

In response to his call, the Operation Sukuma Sakhe District Task Team with the assistance of the Department of Social Development met with stakeholders to deliberate on the matter. Stakeholders identified the following places as temporary shelters; Inkosi Langalibalele municipality: Forderville Hall, Estcourt Town Hall, Khwezi Hall and Bhekuzulu Hall, Alfred Duma municipality: Utility Hall, Agra Crescent Civic Centre and Limit Hill Hall, and Okhahlamba municipality: DSD Centre, Woodford, Acton Homes and Bethany Halls.

Stakeholders were assigned with various tasks and responsibilities; SAPS - to provide safety and security, DSD - essential needs such as clothes, blankets and food parcels and Al Imdaad Foundation - to provide with matrasses. NGOs, NPOs and business sector will provide meals. There's also an appeal to anyone else to assist with whatever they could provide.

All local municipalities have complied with the requirements and will avail these shelters and maintain hygienic conditions. The Department of Health will be doing health screening services. This is to ensure that thorough check ups are conducted including tests for COVID-19 pandemic. Awareness campaigns on the pandemic are conducted on an on-going basis. The shelters are separated between male and female occupants.



MEC joins the district pay out programme

The Uthukela District COVID-19 Command Centre member met with the MEC for EDTEA Ms Nomusa Dube-Ncube in her capacity as the District Champion to brief her about the status of COVID-19 in the district. The briefing was held at the Council Chamber of the Alfred Duma municipality in Ladysmith.

The District Mayor Cllr AS Mazibuko and Dr T Zulu from Uthukela District Health, Alfred Duma Speaker Cllr T Ngubane, EXCO members and both Municipal Managers led the team comprising various stakeholders. Of serious concern was the reported case of a person who sadly passed away after contracting the virus from outside the town and that of another one who failed to quarantine himself after learning about his status.



According to Dr Zulu the lockdown has had a negative effect in terms of conducting public awareness raising campaigns. The COVID-19 tests are sent to the Inkosi Albert Luthuli Hospital Laboratory where the process is much quicker. The MEC was, however, concerned about people's behaviour who have a complete disregard of the lockdown regulations.

She said once a large number of people have contracted this virus it will put unnecessary strain on the health system because of ignorance. "The President wants everyone from the ward level upwards to account for their actions. We need to ensure that our people have all the necessities to deal with this virus effectively", said MEC Dube-Ncube.

SASSA as represented by Mr Singh outlined their action plan in relation to the payment of grants. They have engaged with SAPO to make payment machines available. He then raised concerns about inadequate access control in some of the supermarkets. Vendors were allowed provided they kept social distancing as required.



After the briefing, the team then went to visit various pay points to see if they complied with the requirements and also to raise awareness about the pandemic by distributing pamphlets and engaging the public. SAPO and other banking institutions were found to be fully compliant.

Both Alfred Duma and Uthukela District municipalities assisted with additional chairs in some of the pay points. The Mayor Cllr Mazibuko also addressed the people about the importance of social distancing and the effects of the COVID-19 as well as that as the leadership they were out there to assess and assist during the payment of the grants.

COVID-19 intervention launch programme

The Inkosi Langalibalele Local Municipality in partnership with Uthukela District Municipality, Dept of Health, Bhekuzulu Self-Sufficient Project and Al Imdaad Foundation rolled out the Covid-19 intervention programme at the Municipal Yard in Estcourt. This follows the establishment of the Local Command Team as per the Premier's attempt to reduce the spread of the COVID-19.

The OSS Local Task Team Chairperson Mr VT Nkabinde outlined the purpose of the gathering and cited some of the challenges in the process. He said it was important that vulnerable people are provided with the necessities in order to enable them to combat this pandemic.

The Al Imdaad Foundation as represented by Abed Karrim said the foundation was happy to donate about 30 water tanks to the course that will assist in the fight against the pandemic. Fezile Dlamini from Bhekuzulu Self-Sufficient Project donated with sanitizers, soaps and disinfectants. She said it was important to work together with the government to contain the spread of the virus.



Inkosi Langalibalele municipality Mayor Cllr JM Mbele said they will go out in full force to make sure that businesses, traditional leadership and community at large understand and also comply with the regulations as set by government. "Communities must take extra precautions and lead a healthy lifestyle during this challenging period," said Cllr Mbhele. District Mayor Cllr AS Mazibuko said the district is committed to comply with the regulations as set out. He emphasised the importance of social distancing amongst the people.



"I wish to thank the Department of Health for the great work they're doing in terms of managing the situation and the SAPS for law enforcement during this trying period", said the Mayor. He then requested municipalities to check and work with businesses with regards to the issues of compliance. He also emphasised on the issue of education which will assist to raise awareness about the pandemic.

The Mayor alluded that wherever these water tanks will be placed but the issue of security will be important. He said they'll develop a roster to make sure these tanks are filled with water timeously. The Mayor mentioned that the tanks will greatly assist in the turnaround time of wa-

ter provision. The team then visited various pay points in town to assess the situation there.

to why they were operating during the lockdown period, it's manager told them they fall under essential services category. The employer made an arrangement without following regulations to house about 39 workers on their own will. However, these workers were accommodated in an appalling environment.

On arrival they found that indeed the factory was in full operation. When the team questioned as

On the other hand the management do come to work and go back home thereafter on a daily basis. The factory was then ordered to close down because of non-compliance with the Health and Safety Act. Transport was also arranged to take workers home. There were no sanitizers available and the masks provided were not complying with safety regulations.

As much as the factory had been accredited as essential services but it wasn't compliant with hygiene standards. The management was then advised to get their house in order and will only then be allowed to carry on with its operations once these regulations had been met. By the evening the team then went to Nqubeko FM to do awareness raising campaign on COVID-19 pandemic.
